ULTIMATE NORTHEAST INDIA

2/4 - 25/30 APRIL 2018

LEADERS CRAIG ROBSON

2018 saw a completely new Birdquest itinerary for this remote northeast corner of the Indian subcontinent. Our epic journey lasted nearly a month, and saw us amass a huge total of 530 species. The pre-tour extension to the Khasi Hills of Meghalaya started us off well, with Dark-rumped Swift and Tawny-breasted Wren-Babbler. The grasslands and semi-deciduous forests of Orang National Park produced Slender-billed Babbler. From the Himalayan midlands to the snowy heights in the Dirang Region, we enjoyed the likes of Snow Partridge, Blood Pheasant, Himalayan Monal, Black-tailed Crake, Ibisbill, Yellow-rumped Honeyguide, Fire-tailed Myzornis, Slender-billed Scimitar Babbler, and Bar-winged Wren-Babbler. The mighty Eaglenest Wildlife Sanctuary could hardly disappoint with such gems as Ward's Trogon, Beautiful Nuthatch, Rufous-throated and Long-billed Wren-Babblers, Sikkim Wedge-billed Babbler, Bugun Liocichla, Green Cochoa, and Alpine Thrush. Our first trip to Nagaland was rewarded with Naga Wren-Babbler, whilst at World-famous Kaziranga National Park Swamp Francolin, Greater Adjutant, and Red-headed Vulture impressed. The Assam Plains close to Dibru Saikhowa National Park and floodplain mosaics en route to Roing brought us Fulvous Whistling Duck, White-rumped and Slender-billed Vultures, Bristled Grassbird, and Black-breasted Parrotbill. The weather held out for us in the remote Mishmi Hills, where we tracked down Blyth's Tragopan, Cachar Wedge-billed Babbler, and Gould's and Rusty-bellied Shortwings. On the post-tour extension to the

enormous Namdapha Tiger Reserve, we finished-off with White-cheeked Partridge, Grey Peacock-Pheasant, Hodgson's Frogmouth, Collared Treepie, White-hooded Babbler, and Rufous-headed and Palebilled Parrotbills.

Mammals were also a big deal on this tour of course, and we had some great encounters with Hoolock Gibbon, Asian Elephant, Indian Rhinoceros, Swamp Deer, Asian (or wild Water) Buffalo, Red Goral, and Bharal (or Blue Sheep) amongst many others. The butterfly enthusiasts in the group (including the leader) helped produce a list of 92 species.

The journey began with a pre-tour extension to the Khasi Hills of Meghalaya, where we based ourselves close to Cherrapunjee. During our afternoon and full day in the area, we visited several key sites that were not too far from our accommodation. The impressive Nohkallikai Falls were the best site for the very local Dark-rumped Swift, while our other main target, Tawny-breasted Wren-Babbler was found in scrub and ferns at the forest edge in several places, and gave some great close-up views. A string of other regional specialities included Crested Finchbill, Brown Bush Warbler, Grey Sibia and Yellow-bellied Flowerpecker.

We drove back down to Guwahati Airport and picked up the rest of the group for the main tour, and then we were swiftly on our way to Orang National Park, close to the Brahmaputra River in the Assam plains. A miniature version of the more well-known Kaziranga, the site is dominated by open and semi-open grasslands that are managed primarily for the protection of the endangered Indian Rhinoceros. We had a single afternoon to explore various habitats in the national park, and of course we concentrated on the grasslands. Our best bird this year was the scarce and highly-localized Slender-billed Babbler, a pair of which showed themselves well in tall grasses mixed with wild gingers. The best of the rest included Spot-billed Pelican,

Grey-headed Fish Eagle, Grey-headed Lapwing, and Striated and Jungle Babblers. Large mammals were also easy to observe, with our first Indian Rhinos, three wild Asian Elephants, and lots of Hog Deer.

After an overnight stay at a hotel in Tezpur, we headed into Arunachal Pradesh, and continued on our way to Dirang, with a few brief birding stops along the way. After passing the AP border at Bhalukpong we paused briefly for some roadside birding, and soon found a very vocal Yellow-vented Warbler.

Apart from a break for lunch at Tenga, we continued directly to Dirang, and then paid a visit to nearby Sangti Valley. Black-tailed Crake only showed rather distantly and briefly in its usual area; we had better luck with Long-billed Plover and a singing male Tickell's Thrush.

Our next site in the Dirang region, which we visited on a number of occasions, was the Mandala and Phudung Roads, with their wide-ranging elevations and associated habitats. The cool upper levels with

mixed oak, rhododendron and coniferous forests brought us the likes of Spotted Nutcracker, Yellow- billed Blue Magpie, Grey-sided Bush Warbler, Slender-billed Scimitar Babbler, Ludlow's Fulvetta, Bar-winged Wren-Babbler, Spotted Laughingthrush, Brown Parrotbill, Rufous-fronted Bushtit, Golden Bush Robin, Green-tailed Sunbird, Red-headed Bullfinch, and Crimson-browed Finch to name but a few. The cream-of-the crop included a totally unexpected Yellow-rumped Honeyguide, a nice pair of Fire-tailed Myzornis, and a pair of Blanford's Rosefinches. Towards the bottom of the Mandala Road, there were several singing Rufous-chinned Laughingthrushes, and a nearby site brought us great views of a pair of Black-tailed Crakes wandering around in the open.

Our third and perhaps most exciting destination in the Dirang region was the lofty Se La Pass. The elevation and weather conditions combine here to give us a real challenge but fortunately, during our visit this year, we succeeded in finding almost all of our target birds. Snow Partridge, Blood Pheasant and Himalayan Monal were all seen brilliantly well. Unfortunately however, Grandalas were scarce, and only seen by the lucky few. A great selection of other goodies included Himalayan Vulture, Snow Pigeon, Tibetan Blackbird, breeding-plumaged Rosy Pipits, Rufous-breasted Accentor, Himalayan White-browed Rosefinch, and White-winged Grosbeak. Further down the slope near Senge, we got our first looks at Bhutan Laughingthrush amongst a nice selection of other species. On the way back to Dirang we jammed-in on a late Ibisbill, forging right below us at the river's-edge.

From Dirang we drove to Lamacamp in Eaglenest Wildlife Sanctuary. Arriving in the early afternoon. With an afternoon and a morning at our disposal, we set about finding our main target, the recently discovered and endemic Bugun Liocichla. It was hard work this year, although this often seems to be the case with this retiring skulker. How nice it was to eventually get to grips with three birds that were working a scrubby ravine-

edge right by the road. The slopes below the camp, and also along the Alubari Road were typically birdy, despite the silence of the liocichlas, and we enjoyed a good variety of species such as Blyth's Shrike-babbler, Spotted Elachura, Russet Bush Warbler, Grey sided and Striated Laughingthrushes, our first Rufous-throated Wren-Babbler, Rusty-fronted Barwing, White-breasted Parrotbill, Maroon-backed Accentor, and Gold-naped Finch.

We continued onwards into the heart of the wildlife sanctuary. Along the way to Eaglenest Pass, we enjoyed another pair of Fire-tailed Myzornis, whilst a walk along the road from Chakoo brought close views of Streak-throated Barwing and Broad-billed Warbler, and then an exciting encounter with a lovely female Ward's Trogon. After settling-in at Bompu Camp, we began our exploration of the area. Over the next couple of days we explored the forests all the way down to Khellong and beyond, eventually exiting from the south side on our return to Tezpur. Extensive bamboo, gullies and the zig-zagging downhill road from Bompu held numerous specialities: Chestnut-breasted and Rufous-throated Partridges, Kalij Pheasant, a flock of Beautiful Nuthatches, White-spectacled Warbler, Scaly Thrushes, a responsive Sikkim Wedge-billed Babbler, another Rufous-throated Wren-Babbler, unexpectedly obliging Rufous-vented Laughingthrushes, our first Himalayan Cutias, and a singing Green Cochoa.

The Sesni gullies brought a fruitful encounter with Long-billed Wren-Babbler, as well as Asian Emerald Cuckoo and Coral-billed Scimitar Babbler, while the bamboo area above Khellong was typically productive, with singing Large Blue Flycatchers, Rufous-faced Warblers, Greater Necklaced Laughingthrush, and Greyheaded Parrotbill. At Khellong itself, we were surprised to see a flock of 15 Scarlet Finches in one tree.

After another night at a hotel in Tezpur, we embarked on a lengthy drive to Nagaland. A problem with one of the vehicles occurred right by the Rhino Viewpoint at Kaziranga National Park. This was a great place to spend an hour and just at the right time of day. Swirling vultures included a pair of rare Red-headed's, and there were good numbers of Great Adjutants and Spot-billed Pelicans. We arrived at our cozy homestay's in Khonoma in the early evening. This was Birdquest's first visit to this eastern hill state, and we had two full days to explore the area known as Khonoma Dzüku. A surprising amount of good quality broadleaved evergreen forest still hugs the rugged hills, and there was a typically Himalayan feel to the birding. Top of our list was the endemic Naga Wren-Babbler, a new species for Birdquest as well as all of us of course! The first sightings were along a very steep and tricky trail but fortunately, we later found confiding individuals at several easily accessible roadside locations. Other specialities included the very localized Striped Laughingthrush, Assam Laughingthrush, Spot-breasted Scimitar Babbler, and Grey Sibia. A Blyth's Tragopan was calling from a difficult-to-access location and was unfortunately only seen by Craig. Mountain Bamboo Partridges were easily seen by the roadsides, and other good birds included Nepal House Martin, Brown Bush Warbler, Black-headed Shrike-babbler, the subcontinent-scarce Spot-breasted Parrotbill, Rusty-capped Fulvetta, Red-faced Liocichla, Black-breasted Thrush, and Pygmy Flycatcher.



From Nagaland, we returned to Kaziranga National Park for a two-night stay. Traveling through the Central and Western Ranges in our open-topped vehicles, we had great views of the 'big four' mammals, Asian Elephant, Indian Rhinoceros, Barasingha (or Swamp Deer), and Asian Buffalo.

There was the usual array of storks in good numbers, including at least 19 rare Black-necked, and 28 hulking Greater Adjutants, while raptors included Pallas's and Grey-headed Fish Eagles, and plenty of Himalayan Vultures. A nice pair of Swamp Francolins foraged in an open grassy area close to 'safer' tall stands of vegetation. Fields at the entrance to the Central Range brought us Eastern Marsh and Pied Harriers, and Bengal Bush Lark, along with an array of migrants, whilst near our accommodation, we managed to see both Collared and Oriental Scops Owls, as well as Great Hornbill and Yellow-vented Flowerpecker.

We continued east by road to our hotel in Tinsukia. Early the next morning we were at the now road-accessible Maguri Grasslands, in the Assam Plains. Jerdon's Babbler soon popped-up for some close views and there were more Striated Babblers, but other grassland specialities were hard to come by, save for wintering Chinese Rubythroat and Spotted Bush Warblers, an unexpected Streaked Weaver, and a fleeting Black-faced Bunting.

In the afternoon we took a boat out onto Maguri Bheel. A most interesting experience, resulting in us logging 34 Fulvous Whistling Ducks, 58 Glossy Ibises, and several singing Blunt-winged Warblers, which clearly breed there.

Leaving civilization behind once more, we headed off for the Mishmi Hills, crossing the river at the recently constructed Lohit River (or Dhola-Sadiya) Bridge. A quick stop was enough to add Sand Lark to our tally, while a lengthier stop was made after entering Arunachal Pradesh, this time in the floodplain mosaic near Jia village. Making the effort to ford a small shallow back-water, we were soon rewarded with superb views of the much-wanted Black-breasted Parrotbill, a classic Assam Plains endemic. Rosy Minivet was also good here.

After buying supplies in Roing, we drove up to the guesthouse at Mayodia. Although the guesthouse needs some work, it is ideally situated at almost 2500m, next to the remote Roing to Hunli road, a few kilometres before Mayodia Pass. From such a convenient base, it was easy to explore the seemingly endless forests between 600 and 3000m elevation. As usual, rain stopped play on a number of occasions, but just held off for most of our stay. We found many of the best birds of the area by exploring the higher stretches up to, and beyond Mayodia Pass. This is where we connected with two very rare shortwings, Gould's and Rusty-bellied, thanks in no small part to tip-offs from our local guide Sudesh. The sighting of two "Vulnerable" Red Goral, perhaps a new mammal for Birdquest, was also noteworthy. Other skulkers like White-browed (or Himalayan) Shortwing, and the sultry Blue-fronted Robin also showed surprisingly well, the usual small bird-waves held Manipur and Ludlow's Fulvettas, and the weedy road-edges held a few other nice surprises like Hume's Bush Warbler, Gold-naped Finch and Dark-breasted and Dark-rumped Rosefinches. We also found Blyth's Swift, the *interstinctus* form of Eurasian (or Plain-crowned) Jay, and the nominate form of Streak-throated (or Rufous-breasted) Barwing (quite different to Eaglenest birds, that BirdLife/HBW split as monotypic Grey-

breasted Barwing). One of the biggest draws at Mishmi is Blyth's Tragopan of course. This year we had multiple views, some fleeting and some very satisfying for the lucky ones. Further down-slope the enigmatic Cachar Wedge-billed Babbler came right out into the open for us at the first attempt, while the super-local Rusty-throated (or Mishmi) Wren-Babbler took considerably more effort before we all had good looks.

We left the Mishmi Hills behind and headed back down into the plains. Another spell at the Jia Grassland Mosaic brought great views of Chestnut-winged Cuckoo, as well as Oriental Hobby, Buff-chested Babbler (actually conspecific with Rufous-fronted), Rufous-necked Laughingthrush, and more nice views of stunning Chinese Rubythroats. Nearing the Lohit River, we happened across an impressive vulture flock feeding on a dead horse. What luck, and what a joy to see so many vultures together - at least 60 birds. We counted at least 12 each of White-rumped and Slender-billed (encouragingly including eight and two juveniles respectively), and at least 25 Himalayan.

Another stop at the Lohit River Bridge brought another five White-rumped Vultures, a single Black Stork, and an unexpected Short-eared Owl resting on a distant sandbank. Sand Larks gave better views. We continued onward to our hotel in Tinsukia, for some relative luxury!!

After saying goodbye to those not taking part in the post-tour extension, we headed off for Namdapha Tiger Reserve, tucked-away in south-east Arunachal Pradesh. Once back across the state border, and through the entrance to the tiger reserve, we continued to the beautifully situated but rather shabby Deban resthouse. Early the following day, we embarked on our mini expedition into the forested depths of the park proper. We first crossed the fast-flowing Noa Dihing River by small narrow boat - rather exciting with the strong current - and then joined the main track to Haldibari via some steps up the steep riverbank escarpment. On the way to Haldibari (475m), where we had lunch, we passed through lush forest, large areas of bamboo and clearings, and on through undisturbed broadleaved evergreen forest to Hornbill (610m), where we camped for two nights, before a further night at Haldibari on our way back to Deban. On one day we explored a forested

ridge beyond Hornbill, that took us to the most productive area of bamboo. With so much intact forest, it was hardly any surprise that we saw four species of Hornbill at Namdapha: Great, Austen's Brown (including one in its nest-cavity), Rufous-necked and Wreathed. Down on the forest floor, we lured-out White-cheeked Partridge and Grey Peacock-Pheasant, while denizens of the understorey included a smart Hooded Pitta, as well as the more expected Large Scimitar Babbler and Rufous-throated Fulvetta. A whole range of interesting specialities were attracted to the bamboo dominated areas. Pale-headed Woodpecker showed surprisingly well and mixed-species feeding flocks contained White-hooded Babbler, Red-billed Scimitar Babbler, and both Pale-billed and Rufous-headed Parrotbills. The near-endemic Snowy-throated Babbler evaded most of us, being particularly skulking this year. We had more success with Collared Treepie, and were also extremely fortunate to stumble across a day-roosting Hodgson's Frogmouth. Kingfishers were very much a feature. Ruddy could be heard calling every day, while the stream at Hornbill held both Blue-eared and Oriental Dwarf. Back at Deban, the stony-banked river turned-up our only Crested Kingfisher of the tour, as well as Small Pratincole and another Black Stork.

Once at Deban we made our way directly back to Tinsukia for another night of relative comfort. On our last morning, before heading to the airport in Dibrugarh, we had time for a return visit to Maguri Grasslands. This time we succeeded in getting some great views of a singing and displaying Bristled Grassbird - a tough-to-see monsoon breeder in these extensive grasslands.

Making our way to the airport our epic journey came to an end, and we had time to reflect back on some wonderful experiences.

NOTES TO THE SYSTEMATIC LIST

Blyth's Tragopan Tragopan blythii

A calling male at Khonoma Dzüku was unfortunately only seen by the leader. At Mishmi, we glimpsed 3 birds and some of us had good views of a further male. Three more birds were heard at Mishmi, and we also heard one at Bompu, Eaglenest WS

Eurasian Jay (Plain-crowned J) Garrulus [glandarius] bispecularis

Plain-crowned Jay G. bispecularis is split from Eurasian Jay G. glandarius by BirdLife/HBW.

Spotted Nutcracker (Southern N) Nucifraga [caryocatactes] hemispila

Southern Nutcracker N. hemispila is split from Spotted (or Northern) Nutcracker N. caryocatactes by BirdLife/HBW.

Coal Tit (Himalayan C T) Periparus [ater] aemodius

Himalayan Coal Tit P. aemodius is a potential split from Eurasian Coal Tit P. ater. See BirdLife/HBW.

Streak-throated Barwing (Rufous-breasted B) Actinodura waldeni

Streak-throated Barwing (Grey-breasted B) Actinodura [waldeni] daflaensis

A potential split according to BirdLife/HBW; the division of Streak-throated Barwing *A. waldeni* into Rufous-breasted Barwing *A. waldeni*, and the monotypic Grey-breasted Barwing *A. daflaensis*.

White-browed Shortwing (Himalayan S) Brachypteryx [montana] cruralis

The former White-browed Shortwing *B. montana* is split-up into a number of species by BirdLife/HBW, including Himala-yan Shortwing *B. cruralis*, and Javan Shortwing *B. montana*.
