



NORTHERN ECUADOR TOUR REPORT 2026

5 - 24 August 2026

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The 2026 Northern Ecuador tour was once again a phenomenal success. The tour saw us travel from over 4300 metres at the tops of the Andes down to the Amazonian foothills and into the lowland Choco forest at less than 100 metres above sea level. Along the way we recorded a total of 677 different bird species, including 204 diamond species and an awesome array of specialities from each of the different habitats we visited.

The highlights of this tour were plentiful! We enjoyed 83 different species of hummingbirds, including rare species like the Mountain Avocetbill, Tooth-billed Hummingbird, Hoary Puffleg, Ecuadorian Piedtail, Gorgetted Sunangel, Ecuadorian Hillstar, Blue-headed Sapphire, Black-bellied Thorntail, Napo Sabrewing and Lazuline Sabrewing among others. Our views of these incredible birds were often enhanced by an excellent array of hummingbird gardens throughout the trip. Although the incredible array of hummingbirds was present throughout, there were ample other awesome species picked up as we went along. From the country capital of Quito, we started by descending the west slope of the Andes, where we got our first taste of just how excellent the birding would be! This first morning started us with amazing species such as Black-chested Mountain Tanager, Crowned Chat Tyrant and Equatorial Antpitta. As we ventured to the Choco forest at lower elevations we were treated to a smorgasbord of avian delights, with Wattled Guan, Toucan Barbet, Giant Antpitta, Yellow-breasted Antpitta, Rufous-breasted Anthrush, Andean Cock-of-the-Rock, Ocellated Tapaculo, Chestnut-crowned Antpitta, Oilbird, Dark-backed Wood Quail, Zeledon's Antbird, Long-wattled Umbrellabird, Black Solitaire, Moss-backed Tanager, Esmeraldas Antbird, Barred Puffbird and Lanceolated Monklet being highlights. Once in the western lowlands this bonanza continued with a showy Brown Wood Rail, followed by Sapayoa, Choco Poorwill, Choco Screech Owl, Stub-tailed Antbird, Scarlet-breasted Dacnis, Five-coloured Barbet, Pacific Flatbill, Scarlet-and-white Tanager and Golden-chested Tanager among others. On our way back up the west slope we added

Beautiful Jay and Star-chested Treerunner, before birding the tops of the Andes. Even at these altitudes we added Ecuadorian Rail, Andean Pygmy Owl, Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe, Buff-fronted Owl and even the rare Spectacled Bear! The tour then saw us once again descend in elevation, down the east slope of the Andes to the Amazonian foothills. Here the list of highlights grew considerably with species such as Chestnut-headed Crake, Black-banded Crake, Plain-backed Antpitta, Rufous-breasted Piculet, Amazonian Umbrellabird, Wing-banded Wren, Grey-tailed Piha, Rufous-breasted Wood Quail, Black-and-white Tody Flycatcher, Yellow-throated Spadebill, White-lored Antpitta and the rare Orange-breasted Falcon. We finished off our trip birding on the east slope of the Andes, with superb additions such as Slaty-crowned Antpitta, Greater Sycthebill, Black-banded Owl and Black-chested Fruiteater. Each new location on the trip brought a new array and exciting and rare species, reflected in the staggering trip total.

On our first day we departed Quito early in the morning and began our birding at the Yanacocha Reserve, where we encountered our first hummingbird species at the reserves excellent feeder setup. Golden-breasted Puffleg, Sapphire-vented Puffleg, Buff-winged Starfrontlet, Great Sapphirewing and an impressive Sword-billed Hummingbird were all enjoyed during this first morning. Additionally, the walk to the feeders saw us encounter a range of species from this high elevation with Black-chested Mountain Tanager, Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager, Blue-backed Conebill and Cinereous Conebill encountered in impressive mixed-species flocks, while Brown-backed Chat-Tyrant and Crowned Chat-Tyrant were spotted in the vegetation along the edge of the trail. In the dense vegetation, we worked hard and were rewarded with sightings of Equatorial Antpitta, Ocellated Tapaculo and Blackish Tapaculo. After lunch at Yanacocha, we began our descent down to the village of Mindo. This drive took us through some impressive expanses of cloud forest. On the way we enjoyed encounters with Golden-headed Quetzal and a surprise Baird's Sandpiper feeding on the side of the road. We spent the remainder of the afternoon enjoying the hummingbirds at our excellent lodge near Mindo, where we recorded an amazing 15 different species, including Tawny-bellied Hermit, Violet-tailed Sylph, Brown Inca, Velvet-purple Coronet, Purple-bibbed Whitetip and Green-crowned Brilliant. The day was capped off superbly by a surprise Wattled Guan that appeared in the trees next to the hummingbird feeders, before flying right overhead and continuing into the forest.

For our first full day in the Mindo area, we visited the famous Paz de las Aves, or Angel Paz, reserve to see the array of secretive species trained to visit feeders here over years of dedication by Angel Paz and his family. We started the day with a surprise Moustached Antpitta on the trail, as we made our way to a lek site of fabulous Andean Cock-of-the-Rock, where we enjoyed several males performing. Next was the star of the show, the Giant Antpitta, which gave an excellent performance at the feeder. Our final stop before breakfast was a pair of the delightful Yellow-breasted Antpittas. After breakfast, we added Rufous-breasted Antthrush to the list, before finishing the morning by visiting a feeder for Ocellated Tapaculo and Chestnut-crowned Antpitta, both of which performed excellently. In between, we also spent some time at the excellent hummingbird and tanager feeders. We added Empress Brilliant to our growing hummingbird list, whilst we enjoyed excellent views of Toucan Barbet and Red-headed Barbet gorging themselves on bananas. Additional visitors to the feeders included Golden-naped Tanager, Flame-faced Tanager, Golden Tanager and Black-capped Tanager. In the afternoon we travelled to visit a roosting cave for the peculiar Oilbird. In this small area we got to see 24 Oilbirds resting on the cliff walls. Additionally, in the open areas around the cave we enjoyed our first encounters with species such as Pacific Hornero, Masked Water Tyrant, Pale-mandibled Aracari and Pacific Antwren.

The following day we visited the excellent Reserva Mashpi-Amagusa, with its excellent array of feeders and trails. Our visit here was incredibly productive, and we finished the day with an incredibly variety of different species. We arrived early in the morning to enjoy the birds visiting the moth trap, with highlights including many Zeledon's Antbirds, Scaly-throated Foliage-gleaner, Lineated Foliage-gleaner, Pacific Tuftedcheek and Black Solitaire. Next our attention shifted to the fruit feeders, with many new tanagers on offer here; Silver-throated Tanager, Glistening-green Tanager, Rufous-throated Tanager, Black-chinned Mountain Tanager and the star of the show, the Moss-backed Tanager. Additionally the feeder was visited by Crimson-rumped Toucanet, Maroon-tailed Parakeets and many Rose-faced Parrots. After a long wait, the seed feeder in the garden finally produced a family of Dark-backed Wood Quails, including a young chick! The hummingbird feeders here are also excellent, with Green Thorntail being a new addition to our trip. Around the grounds are a network of trails and walking along these added several interesting species to our list, including Choco Warbler, Choco Vireo, One-coloured Becard and Rufous-brown Solitaire. In the garden there were also some excellent species we saw with two yellow-collared Chlorophonia in the canopy and a surprise Long-wattled Umbrellabird showing well! In the afternoon we spent some time birding the nearby road where we encountered a range of excellent new species. We started with some tricky views of Esmeraldas Antbirds, before a nice Western Woodhaunter and then a smart pair of Barred Puffbirds. After eating our packed lunch, we continued exploring the road and added Lanceolated Monklet, Russet Antshrike, White-tailed Trogon, Purple-throated Fruitcrow and a male Orange-fronted Barbet to our excellent assortment of species for the day.

Our final day in the Mindo area started with a morning visit to the Bellavista cloud-forest reserve, an excellent area of forest where we managed to find several key species including Plate-billed Mountain Toucan, Crested Quetzal, Gorgetted Sunangel, Green-and-black Fruiteater, Streaked Tuftedcheek and Flavescent Flycatcher, while a small flock of Spot-fronted Swifts flew overhead. As we descended the road back towards the lodge, we added Streak-headed Antbird to our morning. In the afternoon, we started by birding the excellent gardens of our lodge. Here we had a short list of birds we wanted to find, and over the next hour we got fantastic views of them all. We started with a nice Scaled Fruiteater, followed by a pair of Slaty Antwren. Club-winged Manakin required a bit more work, but we had nice views in the end. The rare Ecuadorian Seedeater showed nicely for us, and we rounded out the walk with a distant Cloud-forest Pygmy-Owl. Next we explored some locations around the village of Mindo itself starting with a Sunbittern sitting on a nest, a roosting Common Potoo and a nest of Buff-rumped Warblers. We then travelled to the other side of the town where we saw Choco Tyrannulet, Mouse-grey Flycatcher and Ecuadorian Thrush. We finished the day with a Lyre-tailed Nightjar displaying overhead.

The following morning we set off from the Mindo area heading down the Andes towards the coast. We stopped at a site called Sendero Frutti Tour to see the rare Brown Wood Rail, which showed phenomenally well! We also spent some time at a lively feeding station here, with good birds like Little Tinamou and Pallid Dove visiting seed feeders, species such as Ecuadorian Thrush, Great Antshrike and Black-cheeked Woodpecker visiting fruit feeders and then hummingbird feeders on top. Here we added Bronzy Hermit, Long-billed Starthroat and Violet-bellied Hummingbird to our ever increasing list of these incredible birds. The rest of the day was spent in transit, as we continued travelling into the western lowlands of Ecuador, to the remote Playa de Oro lodge, deep in the lowland Choco forest. Along the way we added Brown Pelican and Magnificent Frigatebird as we travelled along the coast road. By mid-afternoon we finally reached the village of Selva Alegre, where we caught the boat to take us an hour up the Santiago River to the Playa de Oro lodge, where we would spend the next three nights. Once on the river, we enjoyed a few birds including the rapids specialist Fasciated Tiger Heron.

We spent one evening and two full days birding the trails around Playa de Oro. Around the lodge we enjoyed the Purple-chested Hummingbirds and Blue-chested Hummingbirds visiting the *Verbena* flowers in the garden, while in the trees around the lodge we spotted the extremely localised Scarlet-breasted Dacnis, as well as Scarlet-thighed Dacnis, Tawny-crowned Tanager, Dusky Pigeon, Five-coloured Barbet and White-ringed Flycatcher. A nearby clearing provided us with more tanager species including Rufous-winged Tanager, Scarlet-browed Tanager and Golden-hooded Tanager, as well as Guayaquil Woodpecker, Lita Woodpecker and a female Orange-fronted Barbet. Inside the forest, the birding very rewarding. Antbirds abound here, with Checker-throated Stipplethroat, Spotted Antbird, Dusky Antbird, Chestnut-backed Antbird, Stub-tailed Antbird, Bicolored Antbird and the striking Ocellated Antbird. Also lurking in the understorey of Playa de Oro we saw a few different Great Tinamou, and enjoyed encounters with Tawny-faced Gnatwren, White-whiskered Puffbird, Song Wren, Lemon-spectacled Tanager and the rare Pacific Flatbill. In the mid-storey there were more excellent species, including the Velvety Manakin, Red-capped Manakin, Black-capped Pygmy Tyrant, Choco Trogon and Choco Black-throated Trogon and overhead we recorded Black Hawk-Eagle and King Vulture! Sadly goodies like Tawny-faced Quail and Pale-vented Thrush remained heard only. At night we searched for and found both Choco Screech Owl and Choco Poorwill. Of course one of the main targets at Playa de Oro is the monotypic Sapayoa. After a frustrating 'heard only' on the first morning, it looked like this peculiar species might go missed on this trip, but on our final afternoon we finally struck lucky, with three of these birds!

Our final morning at Playa de Oro started early, as we said farewell to our home for the past three nights and set off towards our next destination, the forests of Alto Tambo. Here we searched for rare species of tanagers, and had a great time finding several; Scarlet-and-white Tanager, Emerald Tanager, Grey-and-gold Tanager, Yellow-green Tanager and the superb Golden-chested Tanager. Additionally in the mixed-species flocks we added Slate-throated Gnatcatcher and both Thick-billed Seed Finch and Large-billed Seed-Finch. Other good species we encountered here included Choco Tapaculo, Purple-crowned Fairy, Barred Hawk and a White-throated Crake that refused to come out of the dense grasses. Additionally there were several highlights that also overlapped with our time in Playa de Oro, including Ocellated Antbird, Tooth-billed Hummingbird and Black-capped Pygmy Tyrant. We ended the day driving back up into the Andes, and finishing at 1,200 metres above sea level.

The following morning we birded the excellent cloud forest of the Chical Road. We started the morning with a stunning Beautiful Jay, followed by the first of many Hoary Pufflegs. Further up the road we concentrated on finding the local Star-chested Treerunner, which took some time but we were eventually rewarded with excellent views of two individuals. Cloud-forest Screech Owl, Purplish-mantled Tanager, Indigo Flowerpiercer, Handsome Flycatcher and Yellow-vented Woodpecker were all good birds which we seen here. Sadly Narino Tapaculo and Choco Brushfinch both remained heard only. We ended the day with a short but successful birding session in the dry intermontane area near our hotel in the village of Ambuqui. The range restricted Blue-headed Sapphire was our main target and we

quickly found a female. Scrub Tanager was another bird we wanted to find here and we saw several during the afternoon. Other goodies encountered here included Northern Mouse-coloured Tyrannulet, Western Emerald, Lesser Goldfinch and Streaked Saltator.

The following morning saw us ascend the trail of Cerro Mongus, a difficult trail through Elfin Forest and Paramo. The weather was not kind to us today, and we struggled with relentless rain and mist. Our main target, the Chestnut-bellied Cotinga was still spotted by the tour leader despite the conditions. Additionally, we enjoyed several other species associated with this type of Paramo habitat; Purple-backed Thornbill, Rainbow-bearded Thornbill, Tawny-rumped Tyrannulet, Streak-throated Bush Tyrant, Golden-crowned Tanager and Northern Mountain Cacique. The afternoon saw us take a deviation from the planned itinerary, and enjoy one of South America's most iconic mammals in the Spectacled Bear! In total we saw three of these rare animals in less than an hour! After this marvellous encounter we continued exploring the dry habitat and headed to a new location near the village of Tumbabiro to try find the rare and beautiful Buff-fronted Owl. It took some time, but we eventually managed to see the bird singing low down in the scrubby vegetation.

The following day we began making our way down to the Amazonian foothills of the Andes, with various stops included along the way. We started the day with some birding in the dry habitat near our hotel, where we finally saw a superb male of the Blue-headed Sapphire, as well as adding Dull-coloured Grassquit, Black-backed Grosbeak, Golden Grosbeak and Ash-breasted Sierra Finch to our lists. Our next stop saw us visit one of the high Andean lakes in search of the elusive Ecuadorian Rail. After some time everyone was able to see this elusive reedbed inhabitant. Additionally we enjoyed excellent views of Subtropical Doradito, Andean Duck, Andean Coot and Andean Gull, with Band-tailed Seed-eater feeding on the adjacent short grassy areas. We then passed over the highest point of our trip, the Papallacta Pass. Despite the fog on the tops, we decided it was worth trying to find the rare Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe here, and a great decision it turned out to be as we quickly found two confiding individuals. Despite the conditions, we were also able to see Blue-backed Thornbill and Chestnut-winged Cinclodes. We then continued down the east slope of the Andes to our next destination, the Wild Sumaco Lodge, nestled in the forests at the base of the mountains.

Over the next three days we enjoyed some fabulous birding with the company of our excellent local guide Byron. Around the lodge were an excellent series of hummingbird feeders, home to several new species for our trip, with highlights including Green Hermit, Wire-crested Thorntail, Ecuadorian Piedtail, Gould's Jewelfront, Gorgeted Woodstart and Many-spotted Hummingbird, with rarer species being Rufous-vented Whitetip, Black-throated Brilliant, Green-backed Hillstar, Lazuline Sabrewing and Napo Sabrewing. Not visiting the feeders but visiting the garden were Ecuadorian Piedtail and Violet-headed Hummingbird. In the trees around the lodge we enjoyed seeing Many-banded Aracari, Gilded Barbet and Firey-throated Fruit-eater. There was also a banana feeder in the garden that brought in some interesting mammals; South American Coati, Black-mantled Tamarin and even a Tayra!

We spent some time exploring the lodge trails encountering some amazing species. Mixed species flocks here included great species such as Lafresne's Piculet, Golden-eared Tanager, Ecuadorian Tyrannulet, White-fronted Tyrannulet, Plain-winged Antwren, Rufous-tailed Foliage-gleaner, Orange-crested Flycatcher, Golden-eyed Flowerpiercer and Blue-rumped Manakin. In the understorey we added even more targets, with goodies such as Yellow-throated Spadebill, Chestnut-crowned Gnateater, Short-tailed Antthrush, Black Antbird, Blackish Antbird, Black-faced Antbird, Sooty Antbird, Grey-throated Leaf-tosser, Wing-banded Wren and an enchanting session with a Musician Wren in full flow, delighting us all with its complex array of notes! In the canopy and mid-storey were even more special birds, with Grey-tailed Piha, Gilded Barbet, Brown Nunlet and Coppery-chested Jacamar being standouts. Byron had an excellent selection of stakeouts to show us. For secretive Rallids, we got to see Blackish Rail, Black-banded Crake and Rufous-sided Crake, all coming to feed on provided worms. There were also roosting spots for Foothill Screech Owl, Rufous Screech Owl and a fabulous Band-bellied Owl. The Antpitta feeder below the lodge provided views of Plain-backed Antpitta, Ochre-breasted Antpitta and Long-tailed Tapaculo, while the moth traps allowed us to view Black-billed Treehunter and Black-streaked Puffbird. On one morning we also visited a nearby community reserve with Byron, which had a great selection of species on offer. We started the morning with a close lek of Andean Cock-of-the-Rock, followed by a pair of Common Scale-backed Antbirds visiting a moth trap. Finally, before breakfast, we visited a hide which produced a small group of Rufous-breasted Wood Quail and finally two Grey-cowled Wood-Rail. During breakfast we watched the hummingbird feeders, where we enjoyed new species such as Amethyst Woodstar, Grey-breasted Sabrewing and Blue-fronted Lancebill, while in the trees around we enjoyed Amazonian Umbrellabird and Masked Tanager. We finished our morning here with a visit to another hide to see the elusive Chestnut-headed Crake. This normally very shy bird performed excellently!

After three days we departed Wild Sumaco and spent the morning birding around the town of Archidona. Although it initially made us wait, we eventually had fabulous views of the range-restricted White-lored Antpitta visiting a feeder. We followed this up with a roosting Great Potoo, with its chick nestled beneath it. We finished off our time in this area by visiting a viewing area full of Verbena flowers. This

had the desired effect of attracting dozens of hummingbirds, and we had fabulous views of Black-bellied Thorntail, Blue-tailed Emerald and Grey-chinned Hermit. From the viewpoint we also enjoyed seeing Violaceous Jay and Crimson-crested Woodpecker. We then spent the rest of the day driving back up the Andes to our penultimate lodge, the fabulous Cabanas San Isidro.

For our first day based at the San Isidro lodge we travelled to the Guacamayos Ridge trail, a long trail that produces the opportunities to see many unusual species. Highlights from our walk here included Green-fronted Lancebill, the always tricky White-faced Nunbird, Greater Scythebill, Black-billed Mountain Toucan, Dusky Piha, Sulphur-bellied Tyrannulet, Turquoise Jay, Northern Chestnut-breasted Wren, Rufous-crested Tanager and right at the end a pair of Slaty-crowned Antpitta. The rare Marañón White-fronted Capuchin was an excellent bonus mammal reward for the long trail.

The following day we spent the morning exploring the trails around the San Isidro Lodge. An early start rewarded us with a flyover Rufous-bellied Nighthawk, while Rufous-bellied Owl was calling in the distance. Fortunately later in the morning we were able to see one of these owls roosting in a tree-fern! Before breakfast we enjoyed a lively session at the lodge moth trap. From first light the trap was visited by great numbers of confiding birds, including Subtropical Cacique, Green Jay, Andean Solitaire, Black-eared Hemispingus, Mountain Wren, Pale-edged Flycatcher, Flavescent Flycatcher, Marble-faced Bristle Tyrant and Barred Becard. On the lawns in front of the moth trap we enjoyed nice views of Glossy-black Thrush and Black Agouti. We finished off our pre-breakfast birding with a visit to the lodge White-bellied Antpitta feeder. The bird made us wait, but it eventually came for its breakfast, meaning that we could finally go for ours! After breakfast we did some more exploring of the lodge trails and the road outside the lodge. Mixed-species flocks contained several new birds for us, such as Bluish Flowerpiercer, Streaked Tuftedcheek and Strong-billed Woodcreeper. We checked patches of bamboo and found the tricky Oleaginous Hemispingus and Rufous-crowned Tody-Flycatcher, whilst in the canopy we spotted White-throated Toucanet, Olivaceous Siskin and the rare Black-chested Fruiteater. After an afternoon away from the lodge we returned late afternoon and added Collared Forest Falcon in the lodge garden, and at night we had great views of the local Black-banded Owl from the restaurant veranda. The taxonomic status of this 'San Isidro' Owl has been unresolved for some time, but it may well represent a new species. Finally at night those interested enjoyed nice views of the local Lemurine Night Monkeys leaving their roost. During the afternoon we descended the road again to try to find the rare Orange-breasted Falcon. Due to rain this represented our third attempt to see this beautiful and rare raptor, but thanks to the improvement in the weather we were treated to fabulous views of an individual soaring overhead calling loudly. After a celebratory ice-cream we slowly returned back up the Andes towards the lodge, with a few choice stops for various targets including Cliff Flycatcher, Yellow-throated Tanager, Golden-eared Tanager, White-chested Swift and the rare Vermillion Tanager. A final stop after dark brought us fabulous views of the White-throated Screech-Owl.

For our final full day, we drove higher up the Andes to Guango Lodge where we hoped to find the rare Mountain Avocetbill, an unassuming hummingbird with a very peculiar bill. We were treated to fabulous views of this rare hummingbird! The trail to the Avocetbill also produced excellent views of Grey-hooded Bush Tanager, Grey-breasted Mountain Toucan and Andean Motmot. We also spent some time enjoying the lively lodge garden, where we had excellent views of Turquoise Jay visiting fruit feeders. There was also an excellent selection of hummingbirds coming to feeders, with highlights including Tourmaline Sunangel, White-bellied Woodstar and Long-tailed Sylph. In the lodge garden we added Spectacled Whitestart and Black-capped Hemispingus. Overhead we enjoyed our first Andean Condor and a bonus Black-and-chestnut Eagle. We also explored some high-altitude Paramo habitat during the day, first at the Cayambe National Park, where we enjoyed new species like Viridian Metaltail, Tawny Antpitta, Pale-naped Brushfinch and the tricky Black-backed Bush Tanager. During the afternoon we returned to the Papallacta Pass and added Tufted Tit-Tyrant and the impressive Giant Conebill. We finished the day in Quito, spotting Carunculated Caracaras on our way into the city.

For our final day in Ecuador we headed into the Antisana National Park. We started at a viewpoint to see Andean Condor, of which we saw several as well as a Black-chested Buzzard Eagle. At the same viewpoint were several hummingbird feeders, where could see Black Flowerpiercer, Cinereous Conebill, Great Sapphirewing and the always impressive Giant Hummingbird. On the short grass in front of the viewpoint was an especially confiding Tawny Antpitta, while a Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant flew through. From here we walked down to a nearby lake, where we counted good numbers of Yellow-billed Pintail and Andean Teal, as well as six Least Sandpipers. Higher into the national park we found a superb male Ecuadorian Hillstar, as well as both Streak-backed Canastero and Many-striped Canastero. We continued working this area, and were rewarded with Grass Wren, Paramo Ground Tyrant, Paramo Pipit, Andean Lapwing and a distant female Cinereous Harrier. We wrapped up our morning with views of both Chestnut-winged Cinclodes and Stout-billed Cinclodes. After that, we had our final lunch and prepared for our return to the airport and the end of the tour.

Huge thanks to Juan Carlos for his knowledge of the itinerary, while making sure that the trip ran as smoothly as possible and was extremely rewarding for birds. Also immense thanks to our driver Jefferson, who made sure we always arrived safely and promptly. And finally a huge thanks to all the guests on this tour for your enthusiasm and patience throughout the tour, helping to make it so enjoyable.

Species marked with the diamond symbol (◊) are either endemic to the country or local region or considered 'special' birds for some other reason (e.g., it is only seen on one or two Birdquest tours; it is difficult to see across all or most of its range; the local form is endemic or restricted-range and may in future be treated as a full species).

The species names and taxonomy used in the bird list follows **AviList v2025b** (AviList Core Team 2025. *AviList: The Global Avian Checklist, v2025*); this was the current version when the checklist for the tour report was created.

Where the subspecies seen is/are known, these are often given in parentheses at the end of the species comment.
